Miraloma Park has a new Little Library located at 80 Teresita Blvd! The Free Little Libraries are the world's largest book-sharing movement. Libraries help to build community, spark creativity, and inspire reading.

Charles went on to tell me that since COVID he is no longer able to play with his neighbor and misses playing Nintendo Switch and jumping on the trampoline, and looks forward to the day when things get better but said it would probably not be until 2021. We wrapped up the interview with Charles telling me that his school library donated 30 plus books for his Little Library after sharing his story with his class. He expressed the need for more grown-up books, so if you are in the area and have an extra book, drop it by. Last but not least Charles expressed having the library "made his month!" Or maybe 2 months!

MPIC's End-of Year Report

As this difficult year comes to an end, I want to assure you that MPIC's financial status is stable. MPIC has three major sources of income: Clubhouse rentals; Miraloma Life advertisers, and membership dues and donations. Clubhouse rentals have been the major source of our income, helping to fund all of our activities.

In mid-March rental income stopped as we closed the Clubhouse due to COVID-19. The Board began using savings to pay expenses – utility bills, water bills, garbage services, etc. When it became apparent that COVID-19 was going to result in a major loss of income, the Board introduced cost-cutting measures and applied for grants to help offset COVID-19 losses.

We were able to secure a \$24,200 loan at a very low interest rate from the U.S. Small Business Administration, through the Cares Act. We do not have to pay interest on the loan until next year and there is no pre-payment penalty. To date, we have not used the SBA funds to operate the Club. We will re-assess our situation at the beginning of 2021. We have not used Building Fund donations to pay our day-to-day expenses.

Publication of Miraloma Life continues; its expenses are partially underwritten by advertisers. Another bright light has been our membership – dues-paying members of MPIC. Currently, we're at an all-time high of 682 members (of 2,200 households) and membership dues deposited from January 2020 through October 2020 was \$10,705. Thank you, members, for your continued support of the Club!

To those who receive this newsletter and are not duespaying members of MPIC, I encourage you to join. You can go to the MPIC website and click on the yellow "Join" button (https://miralomapark.org/join/). Or you can complete the membership application in this issue and mail your check to the Clubhouse.

Looking to make end-of-year contributions to charities? Don't forget MPIC! You can mail your contribution to the Club. The MPIC is now a qualified tax exempt 501(c) (3) organization. Donations to the Club – in the form of membership dues or contributions – are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law.

More News from the MPIC Board

The MPIC Board is seeing some changes. We reluctantly accepted the resignation of Board Member Daniel Homsey. Daniel has been a Board Member since February 2013. His dedication to the neighborhood is notable and his accomplishments are many. Daniel spearheaded the creation of Resilient Miraloma Park and has been a leader

in its development and growth. He was instrumental in bringing the neighborhood block party – Neighborfest! – to Miraloma Park in November 2017. He was involved bringing Community Connectors and Block Champions to the neighborhood. His energy and creativity are legion and Miraloma Park is better due to all of his efforts. Fortunately for us, the neighborhood will continue to benefit from Daniel's expertise, as he will remain a member of Resilient Miraloma Park. Thanks, Daniel for your many years of service and accomplishments as a Board Member!

December is my last month as Acting President. In January, Board Member Cary Matthews will become Acting President of the MPIC Board and Darlene Ramlose will become Acting Vice President. Both Cary and Darlene have been extremely active in Resilient Miraloma Park. Many Miraloma Park residents know Darlene through her leadership of Miraloma Park Community Connectors. Each will serve two months in their officer positions. As the Board Members cycle through the positions of Acting President and Acting Vice President, the Board continues its dedicated work on serving our neighborhood.

Farewell to Supervisor Normal Yee

In December we also say good-bye to Norman Yee, two term, District 7 Supervisor and President of the Board of Supervisors. Miraloma Park and all of District 7 are fortunate that the Supervisor began Participatory Budgeting in the District. Through Participatory Budgeting, Miraloma Park alone has received about \$260,000 for 11 Miraloma Park projects. These include neighborhood improvements (e.g., Light Avoca Alley; Clubhouse cement path, etc.); neighborhood social programs (e.g., Community Connectors; Block Champions, etc.), and emergency supplies (NERT supplies and storage container, etc.). Supervisor Yee was responsive to concerns raised by MPIC and assisted the neighborhood in other ways. His staff was quick to respond to our inquiries. We look forward to developing a similar productive working relationship with our new Supervisor, Myrna Melgar.

Holiday Wishes To All

I hope you enjoy your holiday season. While our celebrations may be subdued or smaller in scope, we have much to celebrate and be grateful for. Normally MPIC would have hosted a holiday party – entertainment for children and a gingerbread house for them to decorate; a pot-luck dinner, and wonderful music. THANK YOU AIDEN & BECK!

On a recent warm October afternoon, I had the pleasure of walking the neighborhood with two of our residents, Aiden and Beck. On weekends they spend one to two hours on a "trash trek", picking up trash and recyclables in Miraloma Park. Here's their story:

Aiden began this project in early October. He was having difficulty finding volunteer opportunities due to the COVID-19 lockdown. He started doing his trash trek and asked Beck to join him a couple of weeks later. Aiden and Beck are childhood friends, having first met at kindergarten; they are now attending different middle schools. They plan to do the trash trek every week, weather permitting.

Aiden said that in high-traffic areas, like the merchant corridor on Portola, there is a lot of trash. He observed, "The more people there are, the more trash there is to pick up." But given the amount of foot traffic in the area, it is hard for them to social-distance and collect trash. So, they focus their efforts on residential areas.

Wearing masks and gloves, Aiden and Beck walk the neighborhood, picking up trash on the streets and in other public places. They bring two bags – one for recyclables and one for trash. On this particular Saturday, they began near the Stanford Heights Reservoir, walking through the open space between the reservoir and Agua Way. There, they found discarded aluminum cans, paper and trash. By this time, one bag was almost full, so they dropped it off at their starting point and got a replacement bag.

They continued on neighborhood sidewalks, reaching Miraloma Elementary. On the way, they picked up cigarette butts, paper masks, earplugs, part of an earring, a torn

glove and other trash. Moving along toward Mt. Davidson, they collected a coat hanger, deflated balloon, and more cigarette butts.

For the first time, they decided to collect trash on Mt. Davidson. There they found several glass bottles, aluminum cans, plastic bottles and a small light bulb. By this time, their bags were full and they walked to their starting point. That day, Aiden and Beck collected three bags of trash in 1 ½ hours of travel!

What have been the most memorable collections? One day, they collected 70 cigarette butts. Once they found some money and once, they picked up a skateboard wheel.

Thank you, Aiden and Beck, for your initiative and dedication!

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

BAKED BRIE WITH FRUIT AND NUTS

1-2 lb. round of brie cheese (depending on how many people you are serving)

34 cup chopped dates

1 each small apple and pear (peel, core, dice)

1/2 cup each currants and chopped pecans

1/3 cup rosé wine or apple juice

Mix the last 4 ingredients and let sit for at least 2 hours.

Cut the cheese in half horizontally, like a wheel.

Put bottom round of cheese in a greased shallow dish (like a pie plate), a little larger in diameter than the cheese. Layer with nuts and fruit. Put top round over the cheese/ fruit/nuts. Top with the remainder of the nut/ fruit mixture.

Bake at 350°F until the cheese is melted, about 15 minutes. Serve with crackers and/or sliced baguette.

MAPLE PECAN OATMEAL COOKIES

(gluten-free, dairy-free option) Ruth Cox

1 cup gluten-free all-purpose flour (or regular flour)

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

11/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 cup butter, softened (or coconut oil, or dairy-free butter alternative)

1/4 cup brown sugar (or coconut sugar)

1/3 cup maple syrup

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 egg

1 cup rolled oats (certified gluten-free)

3/4 cup pecans (chopped)

(Feel free to substitute walnuts or almonds for pecans and also add dried fruit, cranberries/cherries or chocolate chips).

Preheat oven to 350°F and line two pans with parchment paper, or coat with non-stick spray.

Mix flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon in small bowl. In a large mixing bowl, add butter and brown sugar and beat them together with a mixer till creamy.

Add maple syrup and vanilla and mix together again.

Add your egg and briefly blend it into wet ingredients.

Add dry ingredients into wet ingredients and stir till well combined.

Add oats and pecans and gently fold them into your cookie

Let your dough rest for 10 minutes for the oats to soak up the wet ingredients (or your cookies will spread too thin).

Scoop with a small cookie scoop, and space them evenly apart on your pans (with about 12 cookies per pan).

Gently flatten the tops of the cookies with a spatula. Bake for 10-12 minutes, or till the tops of the cookies are set and cooked through.

Let cool, then Devour! Makes 20 cookies.

BOURBON CRANBERRY SAUCE

2 cups sugar

1/2 cup bourbon whiskey

2 sticks cinnamon

1 pound (about 4 cups) fresh or thawed frozen cranberries

1 vanilla bean, seeds scraped

Combine the sugar and bourbon, stirring well, in a 1-quart saucepan. Add the cinnamon. Bring the mixture to a boil over medium heat, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Reduce the heat to medium-low and simmer until the liquid begins to reduce a little bit, 5 to 7 minutes. Add the cranberries and vanilla bean and continue to simmer until the cranberries are soft and breaking apart and the sauce begins to thicken, 12 to 15 minutes.

If desired, mash your cranberries with a sturdy whisk or potato masher, just to break up the cranberries, and simmer to thicken a little bit more, about 5 minutes.

Remove the pan from the heat and discard the cinnamon sticks and vanilla bean. Allow the sauce to cool. Serve the sauce warm or at room temperature, or refrigerate for up to 10 days -- the flavors only get better as they chill out in the fridge.

SOUTHERN CORNBREAD DRESSING

1 Box of Albers Yellow Cornmeal. Make the cornbread one day ahead; follow recipe on the back of the box for 12 servings of Albers Corn Bread.

1 large onion, small dice

3 ribs celery, small dice

1 green or red bell pepper (chopped)

3 cloves of garlic (minced)

Kosher salt

1 pound of spicy sausage, casing removed, broken into bite-size chunks

1 pound of chicken gizzards (chopped), gizzards are optional!

10 sage leaves, (finely chopped) or ground sage

3 sprigs rosemary, leaves finely chopped (or ground) Approximately 10 cups stale cornbread, cut into 1-inch cubes

2 cups dried cranberries

3 to 4 cups chicken stock

Preheat oven to 350°F

Start boiling chicken gizzards in a pot on stove top (season water with salt/pepper); chop gizzards once done.

Coat a large sauté pan with olive oil. Add onions, celery, bell pepper and sauté over medium heat. Cook until vegetables start to become soft and aromatic. Add the sausage and cook until the sausage begins to brown. Stir in the garlic and sauté for another 1 to 2 minutes. Add the sage and rosemary and cook another minute, then remove from heat.

In a large bowl mix together the cornbread, cranberries, and the sausage/gizzard mixture. Add chicken stock and knead with your hands until the bread is very moist, actually wet. Taste to check for seasoning and season with salt, if need. Transfer to an ovenproof dish.

Bake the stuffing until it is hot all the way through and is crusty on top, about 30 to 35 minutes.

Serves about 8.

WHY DID MPIC COMMENT ON KENSINGTON WAY PROJECT?

Some people have questioned why the MPIC Board approved sending a letter to the Planning Commission, opposing a proposed development on Kensington Way since it is outside the boundaries of Miraloma Park. The MPIC By-laws provide that MPIC can comment on matters arising outside Miraloma Park if the issue is of special interest or concern to our neighborhood. Planning Department decisions set precedent that can be used when considering projects throughout the City and there were two matters about the proposed development that are of concern to Miraloma Park.

First, the Planning Commission was considering a project that will require excavation of Edgehill Mountain. Edgehill Mountain consists of Franciscan chert and is geologically unstable with a history of rock-falls and landslides, including a catastrophic collapse in 1997. Much of Miraloma Park is on Franciscan chert, and unbuilt portions of steep hillsides in our neighborhood exist. (In 1942, the hillside above Foerster Street gave way destroying 700 Foerster and killing a resident.) Allowing excavation in this situation raises safety concerns. Second, Miraloma Park promotes residential guidelines that preserve our neighborhood's architectural character. The planned design under consideration is incompatible with the existing Kensington Way structures.

Given these circumstances, MPIC decided to comment on a project, the approval of which will set precedent that may adversely impact our neighborhood.
