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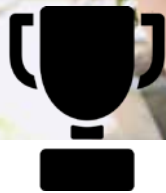

DID YOU KNOW? MIRALOMA PARK IS RADIO READY

We are getting there! Miraloma Park, through Resilient Miraloma, is well on the way to setting up a two-way radio network. MPIC's Resilient Miraloma has established two radio networks dedicated to assisting residents in our neighborhood during and after a major disaster (i.e., earthquake, landslide, storm, fire, etc.) Long range radios have been distributed to 15 NERTs (Neighborhood Emergency Response Teams) as well as other Miraloma Park residents. These radio operators support the NERT Command Center that in a disaster, would be set up at the Miraloma Playground tennis courts. The NERT Command Center team will be kept informed of conditions in the neighborhood through our radio network. Search and rescue teams can then be sent out as necessary. HAM radio operators at the Command Center can communicate with SFFD should conditions like a major fire or a medical condition warrant it. Practice drills are conducted monthly. Many thanks go to Joanie van Rijn for setting up this emergency radio network as well as procuring, through Supervisor Yee's Participatory Budgeting process, the radios and thousands of dollars of supplies needed to support a local Command Center.

MIRALOMA TEEN WINS WRITING AWARD!

Congratulations to Luke Zeponi, of Bella Vista Way, for winning 3rd place in the SF Historical Society's Fracchia Prize contest! In honor of Golden Gate Park's 150th anniversary the Historical Society asked high school students to write an essay on "One perfect day in Golden Gate Park." Writers had to select 6 to 8 specific sites to visit during their walking tour of the park, giving the history of each stop they chose.

Luke's essay is entitled "It's a Ringer! One Perfect Day in Golden Gate Park." His walking tour begins at the Horseshoe Courts near the park's northeastern corner, and proceeds to the Horse and Horseshoe Pitcher Sculpture, Lick Hill, Phil Arnold Oak Woodlands Nature Trail, Coon Hollow, the vista from the Oak Woodlands Trail and the Fuchsia Dell.

Luke's winning essay will be published in the San Francisco Historical Society's newsletter, Panorama. The guided walking tours created by Luke and the other winners will be made available to the public in Spring 2021 in the format of a brochure. Did you know? Miraloma Park ...

Resilient Miraloma Park's twenty-seven Block Champions form the basis for the 2nd radio communications network. Block Champions prepare our neighborhood, one block at a time, to be household ready should disaster strike. After a disaster, and if the situation of a Block Champion's household is stable, they will organize a Block Support Center. Field teams will be sent out to check on each of the neighbors on the block. The radios will allow for communication between the Block Support Center and the outgoing field teams. If a medical, fire, or rescue operation situation requires more assistance than can be locally handled, the Miraloma Command Center can be radioed for help. City emergency services will then be contacted. **IMPORTANT NOTE:** In a major disaster there is no guarantee that citywide emergency services will be available. That is why each block and the Neighborhood of Miraloma Park must be ready to stand alone for days if not weeks. Thank you, Daniel Homsey, Robert Gee, and Guido van Rijn, for organizing the Block Champion Program. Thank you Supervisor, Yee for funding it.



The radios used by Block Champions and the radios used by the Miraloma Park's Emergency Radio team can communicate with one another. Combined, Miraloma Park has 37 radio operators. Given that each Block Champion has two radios our capacity for a total number of radio operators jumps to almost 70! Though the process of creating a well-functioning radio network is ongoing, Miraloma Park has a great start.

The Board of the Miraloma Park Improvement Club has inaugurated a new maintenance program for the Clubhouse and grounds – Miralomans Pitch In & Clean! It's a new take on MPIC! The work effort begins Saturday, January 9 from 10am to noon and will repeat the second Saturday of following months during the same hours. We're looking for neighborhood volunteers to join this effort.

gloves." You'll also receive an email if the workday is cancelled due to rain or other necessity.

MPIC Second Saturday is a result of belt-tightening measures instituted by the MPIC Board. For some years the MPIC employed a gardener. The MPIC also employed a Clubhouse Manager, neighbor Mia Waller, to handle rentals and perform upkeep duties. Revenue obtained from Clubhouse rentals paid for these services. Because of the pandemic, MPIC has not had any rental income since mid-March 2020. As a cost-cutting measure, MPIC first reduced the gardener's hours and then advised him that we could no longer afford his services. Early in the pandemic we had to pause the Clubhouse Manager's services.

Every month an MPIC Board member will lead a team of 6 neighbor volunteers in the morning activity. The monthly tasks will include raking leaves, pruning bushes, sweeping up pine needles, trimming vegetation, removing weeds, sweeping the Clubhouse steps. Most of the work will be outdoors, but there may be indoor tasks too, such as labeling the circuit-breaker, sweeping floors, cleaning windows. Volunteers should wear a mask; COVID-19 precautions will be followed while working.

DRAIN HEROES WANTED

Civic engagement is the heart of any well-functioning neighborhood. One way you can be part of our neighborhood is by adopting a storm drain, a.k.a. a catch basin. Miraloma Park has quite a few drains already cared for by nearby neighbors, but our neighborhood still has many drains that could use some love.

San Francisco's Adopt a Drain began in 2016. There is a quiet satisfaction in adopting a drain in the neighborhood



and keeping it free of debris and plant materials which otherwise impede the steady flow of water in the sewer system. It's also a good family project to introduce



your children to the meaning of community - as long as you are with them to clear any "adult" debris first. In addition, it can be done in your own time frame. Currently, all of Miraloma Park's unadopted drains flow into the sewer system, not directly into the Bay, according to the map on the SF Water Power Sewer Adopt a Drain website. <https://adoptadrain.sfwater.org/>.

Adopt a Drain was started by Code for America, an umbrella group of volunteer brigades that work with local governments and community partners to better communities. Code for San Francisco created the City's program's web application free of charge. San Francisco's Water Power Sewer will give you all the instructions and free materials you will need, as well as emails of approaching storms when appropriate so you can keep your corner of MP safe from flooding and debris.

GOLDEN GATE PARK LIGHTS UP

This winter visit “Entwined” at Peacock Meadow, Golden Gate Park. This forest of lights is the creation of San Francisco artist Charles Gadeken and it is part of the celebration of Golden Gate Park’s 150th Anniversary. The light show continues until the end of February and may be extended to June 1.

Not far away is the light installation at the Conservatory of Flowers. Colorful flowers, butterflies and other designs are projected on the Conservatory building.

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HELP KEEP OUR NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN BY CONTACTING 311

When it comes to overflowing public garbage cans, graffiti on bus shelters and illegal dumping, the city will clean it up right away- but only if someone submits a 311 request. Download the SF311 app to your mobile devices for a quick and easy way to submit a 311 request.



OVERFLOWING GARBAGE CAN AT THE MT. DAVIDSON BUS SHELTER & TRAILHEAD



This overflowing garbage can at Myra Way and Dalewood (shown left) has particularly been problematic since the beginning of the shelter-in-place due to the high number of visitors.

The trash can has no cover and is so small that it fills up quickly. Visitors leave their trash piled on top of or around the

trash can. The crows (and sometimes raccoons) get into the trash can and pull out the dog poop, food waste, etc. and spread it all around the trailhead and into neighboring yards. It's a health hazard.

The MPIC thanks the many residents who constantly submit 311 requests to get the overflowing garbage can emptied, and spend a considerable amount of time each week picking up the scattered trash. We especially want to thank Heather Sears who brought this issue to our attention and has constantly been submitting 311 requests, asking for covered garbage cans, (shown right: covered can in Glen Canyon Park) writing to Supervisor Yee for assistance, and helping with this article.

Help Keep Our Neighborhood Clean ...

The MPIC continues to submit many 311 requests to get the garbage can emptied and requested the following solutions: add another garbage pickup day, add a second can, or replace the existing can with covered cans. We've also contacted Supervisor Yee's office. Our tickets requesting covered garbage cans kept getting closed with the reason that Dept. of Public Works (DPW) only uses the open cement garbage cans. We then contacted the Mt. Davidson Rec and Park manager about installing the same covered garbage cans used inside city parks and was told that the garbage can at the bus shelter is technically not inside the park and is therefore the responsibility of DPW.

Due to the many 311 requests, Recology did add a black toter garbage can at the bus shelter. The garbage problem did improve. But Recology removed it a month later and our multiple 311 requests to add a second can have gone unanswered.

It makes no sense to keep submitting 311 requests for overflowing garbage when there are easy solutions. However, the city has yet to implement any of the suggested solutions except to keep responding to 311 requests to empty the garbage and clean up the area. We continue to work on the issue.

You can help by submitting 311 requests but note that there are two different types of requests to make: 1) for the trash can to be emptied, and 2) for the scattered trash to be cleaned up. The tickets get routed to different agencies. Here are the steps on the 311 Mobile App to request each ticket.

To get the overflowing garbage can emptied:

311 Mobile App Home > New Request > Cleaner Streets > Garbage Containers > Nature of Request (from dropdown) select "Overflowing Public Garbage Can", add description and photo, select "Submit" --> these tickets get re-routed to Recology.

To get the trash that has been scattered all around the bus stop and trailhead cleaned up:

311 Mobile App Home > New Request > Cleaner Streets > Street or Sidewalk Cleaning > Object (from dropdown) select "Overflowing Public Garbage Can", add description and photo, select "Submit" --> these tickets go DPW and a street cleaning crew is sent.

We also ask that you send an email to our new Supervisor Myrna Melgar letting her know about the garbage problem and the easy solutions.

ILLEGAL DUMPING

Garbage, furniture and mattresses are still illegally dumped next to public garbage cans, bus shelters and other public spaces as well as on private property. (shown right: Illegally dumped trash outside Miraloma Park Clubhouse) Submit a 311 request and DPW will usually pick up the garbage within a day.



To report illegal dumping:

311 Mobile App Home > New Request > Cleaner Streets > Street or Sidewalk Cleaning > Object (from dropdown) select the type of garbage > add location, description and photo, select "Submit".

GRAFFITI

Graffiti needs to be removed right away. Submit a 311 request to report buildings, public property and other objects that have been vandalized with graffiti. DPW will usually clean it up within 2 days. (Shown below: Graffiti on Del Vale bus shelter)

To report graffiti:

311 Mobile App Home > New Request > Cleaner Streets > Graffiti > Object (from dropdown) select what the graffiti is on > add location, description and photo, select "Submit".
