In November 2020, California voters passed Proposition 19, which changes property tax benefits for families, seniors, severely disabled persons, and victims of natural disaster in our state. In response, the San Francisco Assessor's Office has consolidated resources, including video tutorials, frequently asked questions, forms and reference links to help you understand and prepare for the upcoming changes. LOVE IS IN THE AIR -SKUNK LOVE THAT IS ...

February and March are the mating season for the Striped Skunk (Mephitis mephitis). Skunk spray can be a feature of the mating ritual, as a female skunk will spray its cloud of oil to repel unwelcome pursuing suitors.

Mating occurs at night; male skunks may travel 2.5 miles per night in their search for partners. The male tries to mate with several females and he defends against other males for a period of about 35 days. Once the mating period has finished, the impregnated females retreat to their dens and the males leave. Females may den under decks, wood piles, burrows constructed by other animals, hollow logs or even abandoned buildings.

The gestation period lasts around 59 to 77 days. Litters can consist of two to 12 kits, but 4 to 7 are common. Kits are born blind and sparsely furred, weighing 25 to 40 grams (less than one ounce to 1.4 ounces). The kits' eyes open after around three weeks, and are weaned by about two months of age. At this point, the kits may accompany their mother outside the den. The young skunks will follow their mother in a single file line (just like you see in cartoons! Amazing!) and learn to forage and hunt. The young become independent after 2½ months, eventually moving to a new domain.

Skunks are notorious for their spray. The skunk's spray is an oily liquid produced by glands under its large tail. We've all learned that it's a bad idea to approach a skunk. They have poor eyesight and spraying is a form of skunk defense. Before spraying, an agitated skunk will first: Stamp its feet; turn around (with backend toward target); raise its tail; look over its shoulder (at its target) and hiss. Muscles located next to the scent glands allow them to spray with a high degree of accuracy, as far as 10 feet.

Skunk spray causes no real damage to its victims, but it sure makes them uncomfortable. Skunk spray is a marvel of chemistry, made up of seven different major volatile components, a couple of which seem to be made to get trapped in fur and be released when damp. That is why it's hard to fully deodorize your dog or cat that's been sprayed. A warning to pet owners: Skunks can carry rabies or distemper.

Skunks are opportunistic eaters with a varied diet. They are nocturnal foragers who eat fruit and plants, insects, larvae, worms, eggs, reptiles, small mammals, and even fish. They'll also eat garbage and pet food left out overnight.

Because of its formidable defensive capability, the

Striped Skunk has few natural enemies. Predators in our neighborhood include coyotes and Great Horned Owls. We've all seen the result of an automobile-skunk encounter on the streets. These deaths are attributable to skunks' poor eyesight; they are unable to see objects more than about 10 feet.

Skunks have lived in North America longer than people. The earliest fossil finds attributable to Mephitis were found in the Broadwater site in Nebraska, in the early Pleistocene, less than 1.8 million years ago. By the late Pleistocene (70,000–14,500 years ago), the Striped Skunk was widely distributed throughout the southern United States, and it expanded northwards and westwards by the Holocene (10,000–4,500 years ago) following the retreat of the Wisconsin glacier. Their adaptability makes them successful urban dwellers.



MORE SKUNK FACTS

- The scientific name for Striped Skunk is Mephitis mephitis, mephitis being Latin for "bad odor". (How appropriate!)
- Juvenile skunks are capable of spraying at 8 days old, around two weeks before their eyes open.
- Skunks eat wasps and honeybees, and will often attack beehives.
- Immune to snake venom, skunks are known to eat poisonous snakes like rattlesnakes.
- Although skunks have very poor eyesight, they have excellent senses of hearing and smell.
- A group of skunks is called a surfeit of skunks or a stench of skunks.
- "Getting skunked" means being shut out or to be overwhelmingly defeated. It is a New England phrase that came into use around 1831.

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BACKYARD ADVENTURES

When you are visiting Glen Canyon, whether for a hike or other recreation, please take a moment to marvel at the miracle of its present existence. At times a dairy and cattle ranch, the site of the first factory to manufacture dynamite, Crocker Real Estate Company's amusement park and private picnic grounds, a zoo, almost a freeway, and a proposed dam (!) to supply drinking water and irrigation, Glen Canyon Park now endures as breath of nature in our densely crowded city. It is one of San Francisco's "Significant Natural Resource Areas." Without the dedication of many citizens, most especially in the 1950's through the 1970's when the "Gum Tree Girls" organized the community and prevented the California Highway Department from turning O'Shaughnessy Blvd. into a 4-lane freeway, this cherished park would exist in a much lesser form.



Glen Park has one of the two last free flowing creeks in all of San Francisco. In its present rendition, Glen Canyon Park is home to numerous planted trees that have continued to proliferate over the years, including the towering eucalypts and lush streamside arroyo willows, along with red columbine, seep monkey flower and horsetail, a "living fossil." Endemic plants include coyote bush and silver mat lupine. Douglas iris, checker bloom, coast poppy, blue-eyed grass, mule's ears that all appear on the eastern slope during our rainy season.

Golden Gate Audubon considers Glen Canyon Park a birding hotspot, and indeed, if you look carefully you may see not just the red-tailed and red-shouldered hawks, and great horned owls, but Northern flickers, Bewick's wren, the elusive wrentit, and many others which stay hidden in the shrubbery. Four-footed animal residents and visitors include skunks, raccoons, and coyotes. San Francisco Rec and Park offers a wonderful map of the trails and access points to the canyon. https:// sfrecpark.org/Facilities/Facility/Details/Glen-Canyon-Trails-399 A north/south walk beginning either east of SOTA on the north boundary, or via paths on either side of the recreation building via the south side on Elk Street, is just over a mile. For those who enjoy a more challenging adventure, SF Rec and Park also offers a "Creek to Peak" trail map on their website. With 3.7 miles of trail within the 60 acres of open space, you can explore many different habitats from creekside to scrublands, with

both seasonal and year round animals and plants.





- 7. Consider getting a COVID vaccination. If you want a vaccine, check with your healthcare provider. Or, sign-up with San Francisco's vaccination program, <u>sf.gov/vaccinenotify</u>. SF's vaccine notify program is for people who live an work in San Francisco. After registering, you will receive a confirmation message and you will get a second message when you become eligible to get a vaccine.


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

SAFETY TIP TO PREVENT GARAGE BREAK-INS


San Francisco, including Miraloma Park, is seeing a rise in garage break-ins. Here are some tips to prevent garage break-ins:


- Have motion-sensitive lighting over your garage, as well as night-time lighting.
- Install surveillance cameras.
- Have a mail slot in your garage door? The mail slot should have a hood to eliminate viewing into the garage.
- Reinforce windows in garage doors with shatter resistant adhesive film.



- Tie your emergency release cord into a small ball to make it more difficult for burglars to reach through a broken garage door window or try to grab with a coat hanger.
- Install an interior manual garage door lock.
- Always close your garage door.
- Do not leave a garage door remote in your car.

SF Safe has security specialists that will walk through your home, at no cost, to discuss ways you can make your home safer and more secure. The specialist provides a free, written report of the recommendations for improvements. 
