UPDATE ON MPIC'S RESILIENT MIRALOMA PARK INITIATIVE: PART ONE

The MPIC launched our Resilient Miraloma Park initiative in 2014. Through our early workshops we held with residents about the risks our community faced, we generated 3 goals for our community in the years to follow.

Goal No. 1: Prepare our residents for times of stress. This included (i.) the launch of our Senior Community Connectors program in 2018, (ii.) holding many types of preparedness events and trainings for residents including our Neighborfest Block Party in 2017 in coordination with Miraloma Elementary

where over 500 residents attended and (iii.) creating a communication strategy for preparedness using our monthly newsletter and email database.

Goal No. 2: Create a response strategy in the event of a disaster. This included (i.) reactivating the Miraloma Park NERT team, acquiring caches of emergency supplies, training and strengthening relationships with neighboring NERT teams and (ii.) developing relationships with our local school, businesses, juvenile hall and church.

Goal No. 3: Create a care and shelter strategy. This included (i.) launching our Block Champions program in 2017 and (ii.) developing a strategy for providing mass feeding and centralized shelter for displaced residents.

MEET GONZALO VARGAS

For the past 35 years Gonzalo Vargas has been our kind, dependable and friendly postman in Miraloma Park. Amazingly, he has had the same route since joining the USPS, while also enjoying a distinguished career in music.

To celebrate and honor his retirement from the USPS, I interviewed Gonzalo, and wanted to share more about this remarkable man with our community. I sat down with him in December to ask more about his life. [This interview has been edited and condensed.]

Gonzalo is not just a musician, but a composer, producer and highly respected player of the traditional Andes guena (single flute), quenacho (another single bamboo flute), sikus (double row pan flute), and antara (single row pan flute).

How did you end up in the Bay Area?

GV: I came to the US to play with the band Sukay (Soo-Ki). I was living in Montreal. With Sukay we played all over the US and Canada in small houses, coffee houses and theaters, all the way to Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall. We performed there in festivals. I liked this area very much. After I left Montreal, I went back to Bolivia (where I grew up) for a bit and came back to tour with another band. But then I realized I needed a more stable source of income for me to be able to stay here or have a family. So I that is the reason I joined the Post Office. I liked it. It was a job that allowed me to keep playing music and keep

developing my career in the music business. It was pretty flexible. But also I love being outside. I'm an outdoor person. I love that part of the job. But meeting the people, of course, that was one of the highlights of my career I would think. I met a lot of people in the neighborhood and I've gained friendships with a lot of my customers so that's the part I think I'm going to miss the most.

How did you continue with your music?

GV: I didn't really drop my music. Once I started with the Post Office, about a year after, I started the band Inkuyo with several musicians from Chile and the U.S. My hometown is a little village up in the Andes called Tapajkari, near the small community of Inkuyo, where there are famous hot springs, known since early Inca times. We did eight recordings, and we were able to hook up with a record label that distributed us everywhere, all over the world. The group became very successful.

How has Inkuyo evolved?

GV: In Inkuyo, we started with four (people); we played close to 5 years together. I stopped playing with a couple of them, because they were not putting their efforts 100% into Inkuyo. I always had decided to do my own music, to compose more, to create more, and to add more to the richness of the music of the Andes. I was able to get better musicians for my own work. I was able to work with an excellent Argentinian guitar player. He did a couple of recordings with me. His name is Enrique Coria. Also Jose Luis Reynolds, master of charango and bandurria. I joined BMI, which is the society for composers.

The budget covers all MPIC activities, including this newsletter, maintenance of the Clubhouse, other committee activities, and membership fees and donations. The finance committee will share that budget with the community once it has been approved.
- 2. We are working this year to update our strategic plan for the Board and the MPIC. We will share the outcomes and goals once they are finalized. One of our goals is to find a permanent President and Vice President. Anyone interested?
- 3. We continue to monitor safety and traffic issues in the neighborhood as well as other issues brought to our attention by this community.

Update on MPIC's Resilient Miraloma Park...

In 2021, those 3 goals helped the MPIC and our neighborhood to be prepared for COVID by (i.) having our Resiliency Team continue to function as the Neighborhood Emergency Operations Center, (ii.) continually assessing situational awareness at all levels especially in our neighborhood, (iii.) continuing our Covid communications campaign for residents using our monthly newsletter as well as issuing 40 Covid bulletins, (iv.) using our volunteer cadre built off of our existing Block Champions and NERT responders as well as other residents and (v.) continuing our Care and Shelter strategy built off or our existing Senior Community Connectors to address those who need assistance.

In this two part article, I will share with you some of the Resilience activities that MPIC worked on during 2021 including our close collaboration with other neighborhoods.

Since the start of Covid in March of 2020, the City's Neighborhood Empowerment Network (NEN), coordinated the gathering of the neighborhood leaders of District 7 including our MPIC Resiliency Team leaders as well as nearby neighborhood organizations, to begin meeting weekly to: (i.) share updates on their efforts to mitigate the impact of

the pandemic on their vulnerable residents, (ii.) identify best practices to bring to their community (e.g. Block

Champions), (iii.) meet with City agency leads to secure briefings and updates and (iv.) receive detailed data updates on the pandemic's impact and the efforts to mitigate at the local, state, federal and global levels.

In addition to MPIC, the other participating neighborhoods include: West Portal, Oceanview/Merced/Ingleside/ Lakeview, Golden Gate Heights and Inner Sunset, Diamond Heights, Lakeshore, Parkmerced, Merced Extension Triangle, Greater Excelsior/Cayuga and Noe Valley.

All of these neighborhoods are collectively known as "NEN Hubs". Our initial mission was to focus on recovery such as restoring service levels and programming levels. But we also wanted to focus on resilience to include preparedness for everyone, people and organizations as well as how we respond with increased integration during times of stress at block and neighborhood levels.

In a January 2021 NEN Hub leaders meeting, we were joined by Kristen Hogan, the City's Dept. of Emergency Management (DEM) Public Information Officer, who gave an update on the vaccine rollout. We also had Sup. Melgar's Legislative Aides Lila Carillo and Megan Imperial join us to provide updates.

In February 2021, the NEN Hub leaders attended the NEN Town Hall on the SF Covid-19 Strategy Update by DEM Director Mary Ellen Carroll and SFDPH Deputy Director Dr. Naveena Bobba.

In February of 2021, MPIC reached out to Sup. Melgar's office offering to partner with the City to ensure our seniors had easy access to the Covid vaccine, to be a conduit for information to

our residents, finding alternative ways to help residents who don't get their information through the Internet, whether there would be another senior outreach phone call campaign and whether the MPIC clubhouse could be a mobile vaccination site.

In March of 2021, the NEN Hub Leaders made a presentation to Sup. Melgar on what each neighborhood worked on before and during the pandemic, our collective readiness goals and how to strengthen the HUB cohort moving forward. We asked Sup. Melgar (i.) to add funding to the budget to support a district wide rollout of the Neighborfest block party program customized to our District's unique resilience needs and goals and (ii.) to support the establishment of a Resilient District 7 council and assign an aide to support us and provide policy and budgetary support for our goals and objectives. Sup. Melgar was very supportive of both requests but couldn't promise what funding could be available.

In March 2021, MPIC attended the City's workshops led by SF Planning Department on updating the Safety and Resilience Elements that are part of the city's General Plan. The workshops focused on how we can



protect and strengthen all San Francisco neighborhoods from hazards and natural disasters. The Safety and Resilience Element Update will provide a comprehensive set of policies for minimizing San Francisco's contribution to the climate crisis and ensuring local resilience to multiple hazards. Meet Gonzalo Vargas

Tell me more about the quena.

GV: I play the straight flute, called the quena. In the Andes there are all types of instruments. There are wind instruments, different types of flutes, and every instrument is played in different seasons, so according to the season you would pick up different types of instruments.

What are the pipes and flutes made of?

GV: They use bamboo. Most of the culture, in the Andes, developed in the altiplano (highlands). However, if you drive a couple hours down the mountain, you are in the jungle. Bolivia, half of it is in the Amazon basin. So that's where the bamboo comes from.

Can you tell me which of your songs feels the closest to you? Is that like asking which child is your favorite?

GV: I have one song that became quite successful. It's called Wipala. This song was picked for a documentary movie called Baraka*. It gave me a lot of exposure. I still get royalties from it.

Where do you think you want to go from here? Once you are retired?

GV: I've been wanting to (retire). Because of the Internet and Facebook, people are contacting me from all over the world and what I want to do is start touring. People are always asking, "When are you coming here?" Even from India. A few years ago we were invited to play there, but then the pandemic happened.

Is there anything you would like people to know?

GV: Most people who know me, just know me as the mailman. They don't know what I am about, so it's a nice

surprise for them to find out who their mailman is. People ask me, "What are you going to be doing when you retire? You won't know what to do." (Laughs) I'll be getting more into my music business. I own my own recording studio at home. I'll be doing a lot of work in it.

Thank you Gonzalo for so many years of "first-class" service in our neighborhood, and for your beautiful music!

We provided comments on key policies that were missing from the existing Element such as the need for specific policy language to be added involving addressing our senior and vulnerable population on the west side of the City.

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
