A BEST KEPT SECRET

29 years ago, when my husband, John, and I were looking to buy our first home, our realtor suggested we check out Miraloma Park. This was the first time we'd ever even heard of this neighborhood but we immediately fell in love with it and subsequently bought our first (and only) home here. Within days of moving in, our neighbors Anna and Michael, knocked on our door welcoming us with homemade raisin bread. Their warm welcome underscored for us why some people referred to Miraloma as one of San Francisco's "best kept secrets." Fast-forward to today and we are still in the house we raised our kids in and as appreciative, as ever, of where we live.

From that first knock on our door, Anna and I became great friends and walking buddies. For over 20 years we have explored our neighborhood and beyond, finding new staircases, steep streets to challenge our hearts, beautiful views, and enriching conversations to feed the soul. During Covid we also became more aware about how much garbage was accumulating on the streets. Even when there was a garbage can, there was garbage all over. We started talking about what we might do to help clean things up.

I went online and found an organization called "Together SF" that registers volunteers in different neighborhoods to pick up garbage. John and I signed up to volunteer in Glen Park and what we experienced was a community of folks that meets once a month to clean up a specific area they

We've had a tremendous membership response right after the January newsletters were delivered. Within the first two weeks in January we had over 110 members join and renew! I want to thank all of you who have supported the MPIC by becoming members as well as the generous support of our residents who have made special donations.

Your membership dues and other generous donations also support publishing this newsletter and maintaining our Clubhouse built in 1943. At the Clubhouse MPIC hosts activities, as well as the programs, initiatives and engagement opportunities which significantly affect our ability to serve the Miraloma Park community.

This month, I want to highlight our efforts involving our Safety and Seniors Community Connectors programs.

Safety

This month's newsletter includes a SFSAFE insert with excellent tips on how to prevent garage door breakins. Garage door break-ins continue to be a problem in Miraloma Park. I want to thank SFSAFE for providing these helpful flyers to MPIC. The MPIC and SFSAFE have been working together for many years to provide safety information to our residents including how to form neighborhood watch groups; to provide free home security analysis; and to attend neighborhood and block safety meetings.

Reminder: Everyone is invited to the MPIC Community Safety Meeting on March 9 at 7:00pm at the MPIC Clubhouse. We will be joined by Ingleside Station SFPD Captain Derrick Lew, District Attorney Brooke Jenkins and representatives from SFSAFE. We held our last Safety Town Hall via Zoom in May 2021 where we had former Ingleside Captain Nicole Jones as our guest.

I want to thank Debra Estrin, the MPIC Safety Committee Chair and the members of the Safety Committee for their efforts in planning the upcoming community meeting, educating our community on safety issues and advocating with the Ingleside Station Captain and staff, and the District Attorney and City Attorney's offices. The MPIC continues to be a member of the Ingleside Station Community Police Advisory Board. I also want to acknowledge Safety Committee member Bryan Forman who compiles the monthly local crime stats in the newsletters.

Miraloma Park Seniors Community Connectors -Changing Neighbors into Friends and Friends into Neighbors

In 2018, the MPIC launched the Seniors Community Connectors program as part of our Resilient Miraloma Park initiative. Before 2018 Miraloma Park had no senior center or library within walking distance. A large percentage of residents were over 60 years of age. The MPIC looked to establish a weekly program that would take place in a neighborhood facility. Studies show that isolation leads to depression and depression leads to illness. Our community was experiencing an influx of people from other cities moving in and displacing neighbors. This trend makes connecting with old friends and making new connections harder for many. With the help of the nonprofit Community Living Campaign, we started a grassroots, intergenerational aging-in-place program that (1) reduces isolation among seniors and adults with disabilities, (2) provides healthy-aging activities (3) improves our ability to care for vulnerable neighbors during emergencies and (4) strengthens ties among neighbors of all ages.

Our Seniors Community Connectors Program was contemplated as a community center without walls. It started as a once a week Always Active exercise program for older adults to strengthen and improve balance and it has been expanded to different activities three days a week at the neighboring Cornerstone Church and MPIC Clubhouse.

BE AWARE AND BEWARE OF COYOTES

December through February is mating season for local coyotes. During this period, we may see increased coyote activity throughout the City, as coyotes search for mates and mated pairs search for dens. The gestation period for coyotes is two months, and after coyote pups arrive, we also see increased coyote activity, as the adults seek needed food. SF's Animal Care & Control receives reports on coyote activity and works with SF Recreation & Park on signage and barriers to decrease the chances for encounters between humans and coyotes.

If you encounter a coyote, Animal Care & Control recommends that you:

- Walk away. Keep moving away from the coyote. Don't run.
- Pick up small dogs and carry them.
- Do not let your dog interact with a coyote. Do not allow dogs to chase coyotes.
- Keep your dog on leash even in designated off leash areas – if coyotes are present.
- If a coyote approaches you shout, wave your arms, stomp your feet, pop open a garbage bag. The goal is to startle the coyote and encourage them to move away. It is unlawful to harass or injure coyotes.
- Consider carrying a cane/stick, an air horn or a whistle with you on walks.
- Never let a coyote come between you and your child or pet.

For neighborhoods (like ours) that have coyotes, Animal Care & Control recommends:

• Keep all pets (cats as well as dogs) indoors, especially at night.

have "adopted" in the neighborhood. We spent an hour and a half picking up garbage. As we picked up trash, a few people who walked or drove by said, "thank you", which was unexpected and kind. What was oddly extremely satisfying, however, was just picking up the garbage. There is something so satisfying about taking a short amount of time and seeing an immediate difference. A woman who is part of the Glen Park effort suggested that if we wanted to adopt a street in Miraloma, we should contact Vince Yuen from Refuse Refuse.

So, I contacted Vince and he guided me on how to proceed, since one of their main goals is to get people to take pride in their neighborhood and adopt a street. Vince created posters for the pick-up, registered our clean up event with "Together SF," and connected me with San Francisco Public Works (SFPW). My part was figuring out what area we should adopt. Often when Anna and I were walking, we saw a lot of garbage in the Tower Market parking lots and surrounding area so we decided that would be the place. The SFPW provides gloves, trash pickup tools, and garbage bags, as well as designates a place to leave the bags and have them picked up.

In our first, recent effort six of us volunteered and we collected 12 trash bags. Afterwards, we met for coffee at Starbucks (which generously donated the coffee) and compared notes on what we found. We shared laughs and a feeling of accomplishment and heard Vince tell us more of the story behind Refuse Refuse (which he founded). At one point, he referred to Refuse Refuse as one of San Francisco's "best kept secrets" and I had to smile thinking of it in relation to Miraloma. I am hoping others will consider joining us on the first Tuesday of every month from 10:00am to 11:30am in front of Tower Market. Turning out for this effort is a nice way to meet new people, make a small difference, and care for our neighborhood. You could even adopt your own area in Miraloma to keep clean!

Be Aware and Beware of Coyotes ...

- Never feed a coyote. Feeding a coyote can put your family and your pets at risk as the animal is conditioned (trained) to approach humans for handouts.
- Feed your pets indoors, or promptly remove outdoor food dishes when your pet finishes their meal.
- Secure garbage cans with a lid that fastens shut or a bungee cord, or keep garbage in an area that is secure from wildlife. Coyotes can tip garbage cans and obtain an easy meal, or prey on other animals that feed off garbage. Put garbage out the morning of your pickup to reduce the amount of time the cans are accessible.
- If a coyote is frequenting your area, let them know that they are not welcome. Make loud noises, squirt them with a hose or super-soaker, or pop a balloon, snap open a garbage bag. It's important that coyotes stay wary of humans.
- Keep pets on leash at all times in areas frequented by coyotes. Keep a close eye on dogs when using a long, retractable leash.
- Pick ripe fruit off of trees, and pick up fruit that has fallen to the ground.
- Clean up around bird feeders. Spilled seed can attract vermin, that then attracts coyotes.

 Keep your yard neat. Overgrown yards can attract wildlife and vermin, and provide a comfortable place for animals to make dens and nests.

If you observe a coyote frequenting a specific area in or near a yard or residence, call SF's Animal Care & Control. There may be someone intentionally feeding coyotes.

If you see a coyote acting aggressively or exhibiting strange behavior, or if it appears in distress or is injured, call Animal Care & Control at (415) 554-9400. Animal Care & Control keeps a log of coyote sightings in San Francisco. To report a sighting, e-mail the date, time, location and any other details of the sighting to: <u>ACC@sfgov.org</u>.

GEORGE DAVIDSON: A MOUNTAIN OF A MAN

I scarcely knew where to begin when writing about George Davidson, the man whom our hill is named after. While there is information here and there on the web, turning that into a cohesive article has proved challenging. What a figure of fascination!



Born almost 200 years ago in Nottingham, England, his family

immigrated to the United States when Davidson was 7 years old. The family settled in Pennsylvania; there he remained for many years. The principal of his high school (Central High in Philadelphia) was also president of the Magnetic Observatory at Girard College. You are on your own with that one. Principal Alexander Bache was so impressed with Davidson's intellect and interest in science, he had him assist him in his observations at the Observatory.

That was the beginning of Davidson's work in geodesy. What is geodesy, you ask? Well you might. NOAA defines it as: the science of accurately measuring and understanding three fundamental properties of the Earth: its geometric shape, its orientation in space, and its gravity field— as well as the changes of these properties with time. The American Heritage Dictionary defines it as: the shortest line that can be drawn between two points on the elipsoidal surface of the earth; a curve drawn on any given surface so that the osculating plane of the curve at every point shall contain the normal to the surface; the minimum line that can be drawn on any surface between any two points. (Whew!) Today, GPS and other complex instruments are used to determine these calculations, but back in Davidson's day, geodetic engineers worked with much more modest instruments which included surveyor's chains, metal bars, rods and tape, as well as optical devices. And they achieved a great deal with them. But back to George Davidson.

Bache eventually became the Superintendent of the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey in 1843. It was the first scientific agency of the US government. [That organization was dissolved in 1970, and was superseded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.] Bache immediately hired Davidson to work for the organization. Seven years later, in May of 1850, Bache sent Davidson and three other men to the West Coast of the United States to produce an accurate survey of the West Coast and determine the geographical positions of prominent features and the optimal locations for lighthouses. It took them seven weeks to reach San Francisco, including a trudge across the Isthmus of Panama.



The move to San Francisco proved to be a pivotal event in his life: he spent the next decades on the West Coast until his death in December of 1911, dedicated to the combined sciences of geodesy, hydrography, geography, astronomy, cartography, and seismology; in addition he was a civil engineer, teacher, and historian and author. Just thinking about that makes me lightheaded. Among his many achievements: Davidson was appointed Superintendent of the Pacific Coast Survey; wrote a book that is still in print today - Coast Pilot of California, Oregon, and Washington; created the base lines on which primary triangulation of the West Coast states was based, known as the Davidson Quadrilaterals; became a professor at UC Berkeley in a chair created specifically for him; and was linked to a large number of academic institutions. He also set up the first astronomical observatory on the West Coast, here in San Francisco. It's humbling to think how much this man contributed to the sciences.



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How does a person of so many achievements fit into the history of Mt. Davidson? In 1852 the Geodetic Coast Survey, under George Davidson, surveyed and named the hill Blue Mountain. In 1911, at the behest of the Sierra Club, the hill was renamed after him. Davidson was a charter member of the Club. The US government recognized the name for geographical publishing purposes in 1916. And that is how Mount Davidson came to be named Mount Davidson.

Some other things named after him, besides our hill home are: George Davidson Medal from the American Geographical Society, the Davidson Seamount near Monterey, a NOAA ship and three (!) Mount Davidsons—in San Francisco, near Virginia City, Nevada, and in Alaska. Alaska also has Davidson Mountains, Davidson Inlet, Davidson Bank, and Davidson Glacier.

More to come on our hill's namesake throughout the world in a later issue.

ADOPT A DRAIN TODAY!

Recent "bomb cyclone" rains caused flooded basements, leaking roofs and turned streets into rivers. Some street or sidewalk flooding was caused by catch basins that were full of leaves, branches and garbage.

To help combat that problem, why not adopt a catch basin through SF's Adopt-a-Drain program? If you adopt a catch basin, you'll make sure that rain and water run-off goes where it should – to a catch basin drain and then the sewer. You'll help reduce localized flooding, promote safety for walkers and help beautify our neighborhood.

Adopting a catch basin is easy. Just visit the interactive map at https://adoptadrain.sfwater.org/.

The map shows which catch basins and sewers are adopted and which aren't. It identifies those that drain to the ocean or bay and those in need – drains that tend to get dirtier than their siblings and need more TLC.



Caring for an adopted drain is also easy. You're advised to clear the drain before it starts raining; put leaves and natural materials in the green compost bin and trash in the black garbage bin and clear about 10 feet on both sides of the drain.

It doesn't take much time and you'll have the satisfaction that you're helping out your home and the neighborhood.
