President's Message

I hope you can join us on Thursday, September 5 at 6:30 pm when the MPIC hosts the three District 7 supervisor candidates for a meet and greet with Miraloma residents.

During the summer, we tried to schedule a similar meet and greet event with the top 5 mayoral candidates at the MPIC clubhouse this Fall. Unfortunately, we just couldn't arrange to have all 5 candidates appear at the same time.

Thank you to all of the MPIC members who took the time to vote for our slate of officers and directors at our June election. Your vote shows you support the MPIC and the work that we do. The MPIC now has a President and VP serving a full 2-year term instead of rotating acting presidents, which we have had since mid 2020.

We had Mike Farrah from Supervisor Melgar's office join us at our June election/member meeting. Mike gave a brief update on (1) the Mayor's budget, (2) SF Planning's Rezoning proposals, (3) SFMTA's proposed traffic and pedestrian safety measures at West Portal, and (4) the redrawing of police districts. Many thanks to MPIC Board member Todd Siemers and his fellow band members who provided the jazz music entertainment at the election/meeting.

In July, the MPIC submitted a letter to SFMTA supporting the latest plan to improve traffic and pedestrian safety changes in the West Portal area, a location where many residents in Miraloma Park frequently visit.

I want to thank the volunteers from the California Native Plant Society (CANPS) who helped remove problematic weeds in the MPIC native plant garden in June. The MPIC always appreciates the CANPS's expertise and assistance.

In late June, Supervisor Melgar announced the District 7 Participatory Budget winning projects for the 2024-2025 year. The Marietta median project that the MPIC voted to support was a winning project. I want to thank Miraloma residents Molly Tirpak Sterkel and Robin Shostack for submitting this project.

In August, the MPIC board voted to join the Diamond Heights Community Association and the Glen Park Association in asking the SF Rec & Park Dept to construct and integrate green infrastructure into the top of Glen Canyon Park that would absorb/buffer stormwater runoff and have positive impacts along Islais Creek.

Lastly, thank you to our Miraloma Park block champions Mike Anderson (Coventry Ct), Marlene Saks and Vivienne Antal (Teresita Blvd) for hosting summer ice cream socials with their neighbors. The MPIC is committed to supporting our Block Champions by helping them host these ice cream socials at different locations throughout Miraloma Park to inform their neighbors of the important role of Block Champions especially in disasters and the emergency equipment that the MPIC has provided them.

Change is always hard, especially when it happens back to back. Over the last 12 months, we've been experiencing ongoing change at Miraloma Elementary School. In 2016, Noah Ingber joined Miraloma and was the principal for seven years; my son was there for his final two. Due to some unforeseen circumstances, Noah took some time away and Ms. Diane Thompson joined as our Interim Principal. Ms. Thompson was previously a teacher at Miraloma Elementary from 2009-2014. The teachers who had previously worked with her were excited to have her back at Miraloma ES in this leadership position. California's New Daylighting Law (AB 413)

These diagrams show how the clearance of 20 feet can make a big difference for street safety at our painted and unpainted crosswalks.

Starting on January 1, 2024, it is illegal in California to park within 20 feet of the approach of any marked or unmarked crosswalk, even if the approach does not have any red curbs painted.

What is Daylighting?

Daylighting is the simple concept that safety is improved by removing parked cars next to crosswalks. By keeping the area next to crosswalks clear of parked vehicle obstructions, people walking and people driving or riding on the street can see each other better. Beginning January 1, 2024, remember to leave at least 20 feet (or one large car length) between a marked or unmarked crosswalk and your vehicle, so approaching vehicles can see the pedestrians. **How does it work?**

Daylighting increases the visual field of both pedestrians crossing the street, and drivers pulling up to an intersection. The diagram shows how much easier the extra space makes it to see the curbs and the entire crosswalk. For pedestrians, daylighting means that they don't have to venture into the intersection and peek around parked cars to see if they have a clear path to cross. This is especially important for children, who are less visible at intersections. At the same time, drivers get a clearer view of the intersection and can easily see if someone is waiting to cross well in advance of reaching the crosswalk.

California Assembly Bill 413

AB 413 passed in October 2023 by the State Legislature and replicates the law in other states that similarly require people not to park right next to any crosswalk. Specifically, the law:

- Creates a new section of the Vehicle Code, CVC 22500(n), which prohibits the stopping, standing, or parking of a vehicle within 20 feet of the vehicle approach side of any unmarked or marked crosswalk or 15 feet of any crosswalk with a curb extension anywhere in California.
- On a two-way street, only the space on the right-side approaching a crosswalk as one is driving is affected. However, on a one-way street, both the left and the right curb areas 20 feet from the crosswalk are no parking zones.
- Prior to January 1, 2025, cities like San Francisco will only issue a warning for a violation, and will not issue a citation, unless the violation occurs in an area marked using paint or a sign.
- Allows local jurisdictions to paint zones that are longer or shorter than 20 feet. When you see a red curb or parking prohibition sign next to a crosswalk just follow that distance. If there is no paint or signs, the 20 feet distance applies. 20 feet is about the length of a standard parking space or one large car-length.

SFFD Chief Jeanine Nicholson has awarded Miraloma Park's Joan van Rijn Outstanding Volunteer Service for Teambuilding in the NERT program due to her ongoing efforts on behalf of the city-wide NERT effort.

The San Francisco Fire Department created a pilot program to organize all of the NERT Coordinators into a Battalion-based structure. Joanie took on the responsibility to become the very first NERT Battalion Coordinator. The largest Battalion for NERT with 24 neighborhoods, Batt 9 stretches from Visitacion Valley to Miraloma Park to Stonestown. Joanie has arranged regular meetings for the last year to bring Coordinators in the Battalion together to collaborate, share information, and provide advanced training from invited guests. These training sessions have been videotaped and made available to other NERTS on YouTube. She created a game "Truth or Nah," a way to practice details from the NERT training manual.
