I have met so many neighbors recently at different MPIC events and I am humbled by how many say they recognize me from my old picture in the newsletter and more importantly, they said they do read the newsletter and my monthly President's Message.

This month I focus my message on gratitude and appreciation. The MPIC couldn't function and Miraloma Park wouldn't be a great community without the work of all our volunteers and the organizations that support us.

I want to thank Darlene Ramlose (Care and Shelter lead), Guido Van Rijn, Mia Waller, Hector Moreno and Clifton Hong who helped move about 2,000 lbs. of MPIC Care and Shelter equipment from the MPIC Clubhouse basement to our storage container on the very hot morning of October 5.

We held our fifth Miraloma Park Block Champions Ice Cream Social on October 6 on Los Palmos Dr. at Foerster Ave. I want to thank our Block Champion hosts Guido and Joan Van Rijn, Jean Perata, Karen Breslin and Mike Dahlin. It was one of the hottest days of the year but also had the largest neighbor attendance by far with new families, lots of kids and longtime residents. Thank you to MPIC Board Members Patti Moran, Todd Siemers, Kate Clements and Mary Fitzpatrick who greeted neighbors and helped serve ice cream.

Thank you to the San Francisco Dept of Emergency Management (SFDEM) for supporting our Resiliency program. The MPIC just received a nice boost from SFDEM; they recently provided the MPIC, as well as other neighborhoods throughout the City, an emergency disaster wheeled container that contains three-days worth of sheltering supplies for 200 individuals. These supplies will supplement the MPIC's existing care and shelter supplies for building a temporary neighborhood shelter in the event of a disaster or emergency incident. This container has:

- 200 Emergency Survival Blankets
- 200 Waterproof Ponchos
- 200 Hand Warmers (Pair)
- 20 Wool Blankets (60 x 80 inch)
- 10 Plastic Tarps (5' x 7')
- 5 Rolls of Duct Tape (50 yards)
- 5 Nyon Cords (50')
- 5 Utility Knives

Thank you to Miraloma resident Geoff Coffey of Madrono Landscaping who helped us identify many plants in our redesigned native plant garden as part of our efforts to design and install educational signage.

We had a great turnout at our Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) meeting at the MPIC Clubhouse parking lot on October 10 where NERTs from across SFFD Battalion 9 attended. But I want to acknowledge our dedicated Miraloma Park NERTs who participated during the very cold, windy and foggy evening to learn more about our NERT activation plans and equipment we have for Miraloma Park: Joanie Van Rijn (our NERT coordinator), Guido Van Rijn, Bryan Forman, Mary Fitzpatrick, Karen Breslin, Anne Marie Murtagh and Orian Williams.

Once again, a huge thank you goes to Ken Matthews and the Marietta Dr. neighbors and volunteers for their efforts at the annual community cleanup on October 20 at the open space on Marietta Drive known as Reservoir Lands.

Thank you to Tazi Coffee, Todd Siemers and Mike Murray for their help at our Second Saturday workday at the MPIC Clubhouse in October where they prepped a planting area for new native plants by removing weeds, placing cardboard to block weeds and covering the area with wood chips.

Thank you to Guido Van Rijn for leading our first ever Block Champions Emergency Cookout Demonstration at the MPIC Clubhouse in October. It was attended by Block Champions Karen Breslin, Joanie Van Rijn, Bryan Forman, Darryl Browne, Anne Kearney, Marlene Saks, Justin Ryckebusch, Jean Perata and Kevin Caravello.

We are very appreciative of the California Native Plant Society for donating and installing 64 new native plants at the MPIC Clubhouse grounds on October 17.

It was long overdue, but thank you to the Department of Public Works for the substantial amount of tree-trimming done along Marietta Dr. in October. To clarify, this work was unrelated to the recent District 7 Participatory Budget Grant that was awarded for median planting work along Marietta. DPW has just assigned a project manager to oversee the median planting project. I want to thank Marietta Dr. residents Robin S. and Molly T. for submitting this winning project and working with DPW to move the project forward.

How Ranked-Choice Voting Works

Broadly speaking, the ranked-choice voting process unfolds as follows for single-winner elections:

- Voters rank the candidates for a given office by preference on their ballots.
- If a candidate wins an outright majority of first-preference votes (i.e., 50 percent plus one), that candidate will be declared the winner.
- If, on the other hand, no candidate wins an outright majority of first-preference votes, the candidate with the fewest first-preference votes is eliminated.

- All first-preference votes for the failed candidate are eliminated, and second-preference choices on these ballots are then counted as first-preference.
- A new tally is conducted to determine whether any candidate has won an outright majority of the ballots.
- The process is repeated until a candidate wins a majority of votes cast.

In several forums outside the official voter guide, various entities and persons encourage voters not to exercise their right to rank all candidates. The theory is that if that person is not ranked, the candidate will have fewer votes, and thus cannot win the election. That is not necessarily the case. In Ranked Choice Voting (RCV), if you don't rank all the candidates, your vote will still count for the highest-ranked candidate you selected. If that candidate is eliminated in the counting process, your vote won't transfer to any other candidate since you didn't rank them. This means that if your top choice is eliminated, you won't have a say in subsequent rounds. It's generally a good idea to rank as many candidates as you feel comfortable with to ensure your vote has the maximum impact.

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Your Miraloma Park Traffic Update

SFPD Traffic Enforcement Continues in Miraloma Park

Ingleside Station Captain Amy Hurwitz informed the MPIC that she will continue to have her officers conduct traffic enforcement at the intersection of Stillings Ave. and Teresita Blvd. You should also expect to see enforcement at the intersection of Teresita Blvd. and Reposa Way.

Can't See the New Cement Median Islands at Teresita and Reposa?

The MPIC has received many comments about the lack of visibility of the new cement median islands at the intersection of Teresita Blvd and Reposa Way. We have followed up with the SF Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) and they have submitted a paint order to paint the islands to make them more visible.

SFMTA Studying Traffic on Evelyn Way and Stillings Ave.

The MPIC receives many inquiries from residents about

how speed humps or other traffic calming measures can be installed on their streets. We inform the residents about the SFMTA's traffic calming application procedures and how the application process involves SFMTA collecting data to evaluate speed and number of autos over a period of time. If the data shows excess speeds on the street, the SFMTA will propose solutions such as speed humps or other types of devices to slow cars down.

I'm sure many of you drive on Evelyn Way to get to and from Portola Blvd. You may find that with many cars parked on both sides of the street, it can be too narrow for cars to pass each other. There are concerns about speeding and residents having difficulty backing out of their driveways.

In response to a resident submitting a traffic calming application to SFMTA earlier this year, in October the SFMTA installed roadway cables on Evelyn Way to collect data. SFMTA is now evaluating the data for next steps.

For many Miraloma Park residents as well as those using navigation apps, you probably get to Highways 101 and 280 by going on Teresita Blvd. and then turning on Stillings Ave. to head down the hill towards Congo St. Residents on Stillings Ave. are concerned about speeding. A resident also submitted a traffic calming application to SFMTA earlier this year to evaluate Stillings Ave. In October the SFMTA also installed roadway cables on Stillings Ave. to collect data. SFMTA is now evaluating that data for next steps.

Block Champions Conduct the First Ever Emergency Cookout Demonstration

On September 26th a small group of Block Champions (BCs), some with their families, came to the MPIC Clubhouse parking lot to witness MPIC's first ever emergency cooking demonstration using the equipment pictured. The event was a great opportunity for BCs to reconnect with each other. In short, it was an enjoyable event featuring the perfect emergency food of hot dogs, pork & beans, and salad.

Why might some BCs use an outdoor cooker rather than a barbeque? In an emergency both are, of course, very useful. I would, however, posit that the two 30,000 BTU burners can much more efficiently cook soups and stews when a disaster or smaller event such as a lengthy blackout or other disruptive event occurs. Even after one day, frozen foods may begin to defrost and must quickly be used up before they spoil. Meats and fish are particularly vulnerable to spoilage. After that, canned and dried foods become the most frequently cooked items. Each household should have enough emergency food stored to last for at least a week including shelf-stable items such as cereal, crackers, canned fish/meat, nutrition bars, etc. A few block champions may have access to one of these cookers to help feed, after a disaster, neighbors on their block. Though this article is focused on the Block Champion response for their neighbors, a neighborhood-wide Care and Shelter site is in Resilient Miraloma's planning stages and includes feeding post-disaster Miralomans in need.





There were multiple lessons learned from this Block Champion practice event:

- Propane tanks must be available. BC neighbors may be in a position to share.
- BC neighbors might be in a position to share safe, perishable foods and canned/dried goods.
- Fresh produce must be checked and washed before
- Dried foods, such as beans and pasta, are excellent foods but require water for cooking, and can take a fair amount of time to prepare.
- Neighbors may help provide canned goods, many of which contain enough water to heat and serve.
- Properly cleaning produce, utensils, pots and pans all require a great deal of water.

This list of "lessons" is far from complete. However, a couple of things stand out. First, the incredible need for water in almost every stage of cooking from preparation, to actual cooking, to cleanup. Water may NOT be available after a disaster. Households need to have plenty of stored water (including the hot water heater tank). It's a good thing that many canned goods do not require water for heating or cooking. Second, MPIC's Resilient Miraloma has come a long way in preparing Miraloma Park for disaster. We have the supplies. We have the NERTs, Block Champions, Radio Operators and a Care and Shelter Team in the making.
