What's In a Name? Streets In Miraloma Park

In my walks around Miraloma Park, I noticed there are a number of street names in our neighborhood which are Spanish in origin. Here's a few:

Bella Vista: Beautiful view

Gaviota: Seagull Arroyo: Stream Reposa: Rest

El Sereno: The Serene Teresita: Little Teresa

I was puzzled by Del Vale, which translated from Spanish means "of the voucher." My guess is that Del Valle (of the valley) was probably what was meant. I could not find any

reference to the street name "La Bica." Street names such as Stillings and Foerster are surnames.

Other street names I have been able to research are Stillings, Foerster, and O'Shaughnessey.

Stillings was named for Calvin and Ada Stillings, who built a farmhouse at the corner of Stillings and (what is now) Nordhoff after the 1906 earthquake, when their original home was destroyed. The remnants of the original farmhouse are currently under renovation. Foerster was named after Constantine (Stanley) Foerster, who eventually joined in partnership to form what became one of San Francisco's largest law firms, Morrison & Foerster. O'Shaughnessey Boulevard is named after Michael O'Shaughnessey, who was for a time the San Francisco City Engineer, and responsible for numerous projects in the City.

I am grateful to the work of the Glen Park History Project for information on the Stillings family, and to Amy O'Hair, who continues to do remarkable work researching the Sunnyside area. For a deep dive into those two name places, please visit the websites below, where this information was found.

Adopt a Drain!

Thinking of a way to support your community this year? Why not adopt a drain? If you adopt a drain, you'll make sure that rain and water run-off goes where it should – to a catch basin drain and then the sewer. You'll help reduce localized flooding, promote safety for walkers and help beautify our neighborhood.

My husband and I adopted a drain at the corner of Teresita and Stillings. Why that drain? One of my neighbors had already adopted a catch basin close to our home. (Thanks, Jonathan!) I visited the SF Adopt-a-Drain website (https://adoptadrain.sfwater.org/) to see if a catch basin at the west side of the Stillings and Teresita intersection was available. Why that catch basin? It's close to our home and the drain is in a crosswalk and near a 36 Bus stop. (Both the crosswalk and bus stop see heavy foot traffic.)

On the website I found that some Miraloma catch basins had been adopted, but many are in need of adoption. I also discovered that the catch basin at Stillings and Teresita was open for adoption. As part of the adoption process, we were

able to name the catch basin. I named it "Catch-22". My husband and I swept the gutters leading to Catch-22 and removed the pine needles, leaves and tree branches that had gathered at the catch basin. All went into the green bin.

Adopting a catch basin is easy. The interactive map at https://adoptadrain.sfwater.org/ is easy to use and interesting. It shows which catch basins and sewers are adopted and which aren't. It identifies those that drain to the ocean or bay and those in need – drains that tend to get dirtier than their siblings and need more TLC. Caring for an adopted drain is also easy. You're advised to clear the drain before it starts raining; put leaves and natural materials in the green compost bin and trash in the black garbage bin and clear about 10 feet on both sides of the drain.

So, give some thought to adopting a catch basin. Joint custody (adoption by your and your neighbor) is possible. Consider a family adoption. It teaches children the importance of community involvement and taking care of their neighborhood.

Are You Looking to Hire a Contractor?

We see many residents posting on the social media platform Nextdoor seeking recommendations for a wide variety of repair and construction work. In addition, some individuals go door to door in our neighborhood offering repair services for cash. Sometimes, seniors are targeted. These individuals offer to do a repair job for a small amount to be paid in cash and return later, demanding a much larger amount of cash. This scenario was discussed at one of the SFPD Ingleside community meetings.

So, before you hire anyone, we wanted to share with you these tips from the Contractors State License Board:

Some things to keep in mind when hiring a contractor:

- Must be a licensed contractor to do work on your home that exceeds \$500.
- A contractor cannot request or accept a deposit for work for more than \$1000 or 10% of the contract price, whichever is less. So if the contract price is \$5000, the maximum deposit would be \$500.
- You should always check if the contractor's license matches their name and is active on the CSLB website. https://cslb.ca.gov/OnlineServices/ CheckLicenseII/ CheckLicense.aspx
- A contractor can only request progress payments for work that has already been done. A contractor can not ask for "progress payments" if the total payments exceed the value of the work done.
- Always get multiple bids and don't get pressured into signing a contract.

It's always best to get a contract in writing with the names of the contractor and the homeowner, the scope of work to be performed, and the price agreed upon. Any change orders should also be in writing and agreed upon by the parties.

10 Tips

Make Sure Your Contractor Measures Up



- 1 Hire only state-licensed contractors.
- 2 Check a contractor's license number online at www.cslb.ca.gov or by calling 800.321.CSLB (2752).
- 3 Get at least three bids.
- 4 Get three references from each bidder and review past work in person.
- 5 Make sure all project expectations are in writing and only sign the contract if you completely understand the terms.
- 6 Confirm that the contractor has workers' compensation insurance for employees.
- 7 Avoid paying more than 10% down or \$1,000, whichever is less. * Avoid paying in cash.
- 8 Avoid letting payments get ahead of the work.
- 9 Keep a job file of all papers relating to your project, including all payments.
- 10 Avoid making the final payment until you're satisfied with the job.

*There is an exception to this rule for about a dozen contractors who have field a blanket performance and payment bond with the Registrar. This information is noted on the contractor's license detail page on CSLB's website.



Miraloma Playground Scores a 92% in the City's Annual Park Maintenance Standards Evaluation Report

In November 2024, the City released its annual Park Maintenance Standards Evaluation Report for Fiscal Year 2024. City voters added a requirement to the City Charter in 2003 to establish standards for park maintenance. The charter also requires that the Controller's Office and Recreation and Parks Department (RPD) evaluate how well the City's parks meet those standards each year.

Each park is given a score based on almost 300 different standards. The city-wide average park score is 91%, the same as last year. The average score is also above the minimum goal of 85%, which RPD establishes as the benchmark for a well-maintained park. More than 85% of the 171 parks meet or exceed this threshold, meaning that more than four-fifth of parks across the City are well-maintained.

So most importantly, how was our Miraloma Playground rated? It received a score of 92%. We dug into the City database so you wouldn't have to:
